The tenses are named here according to their construction. Please note that the names of these tenses vary considerably according to author.

- Simple tenses have a one word verb.
- Continuous tenses are formed with a present participle ending in 'ing'.
- The present perfect = the present simple of 'have' + a past participle + other elements (i.e. 'ing' form for the continuous tenses)
- Conditional tenses contain a conditional verb; 'would' is used in these examples.
- Future tenses contain a future verb; 'will' is used in these examples.
